Cumann Lúthchleas Gael launched "The GAA Strategic Vision and Action Plan 2010 – 2015" and requested each county Board under the association's jurisdiction to examine it's structures and organisation, their strengths and deficits and to form an agreed action plan which would allow the association to continue developing and at the same time consolidating its ethos over the ensuing years.

In May 2010 I invited the above Committee to examine all areas at local level and to consult with our members working in all facets of our games. The terms of reference of the Committee included inter-alia.

- 1. The impact of Urbanisation vis-a-vis other codes.
- 2. The organised scheduling of our games.
- 3. The ongoing role of our invaluable volunteers, and the Board's financial structures to ensure that there are proper checks and balances in place in order to safeguard the it's finances.
- 4. Inclusion and Integration.
- 5. The role of the club in fostering culture and excellent Community spirit.
- 6. Overall planning and Development of the aims of Cumann Lúthchleas Gael at club level.
- 7. Officer support and back up services for Club members.

As part of the consultation process the Committee commenced its work in May 2010 by holding a Club Forum where all club representatives were requested to express their views and make submissions if deemed necessary under the above headings. The response was over whelming and the views expressed are reflected in the Committee's final report. I thank the members of our clubs who contributed to the debate and who made individual submissions. In preparing their final report the Committee was mindful of the necessity to ensure that it was an all-inclusive report, reflecting all shades of opinion. The report does not shirk it's responsibilities by highlighting the strengths and weaknesses within our Association in equal measure. Only by knowing the true extent of any weaknesses within our structures can we hope to find a panacea to address such shortcomings.

The Committee has provided the direction in which our Association should be moving in the 21st century. I undertake to ensure that the recommendations will be fully implemented and we will set our selves tasks that will involve the monitoring of progress. With the assistance of all units within our Association, I am satisfied that Coiste na Mí will not be found wanting in ensuring that the G.A.A. continues to lead and that it will truly be one of the great sporting organisations on this planet. We are determined to pass on an Association to the next generation of which they can be proud.

Introduction...

Brief History of the GAA in Neath

Meath's record of sevice to the growth and well-being of Cumann Luthchleas Gael is a source of much pride for Gaels throughout the county.

Within a year of the Association's foundation in Thurles in 1884, a number of clubs were formed in the county, among them Duleek and Yellow Furze (Seneschalstown), areas in which there are still vibrant and thriving clubs.

The first County Convention was held in 1887 and 15 clubs were represented. In the same year, the 1st football championship was organised with an entry of 12 teams. Dowdstown (now Walterstown) were the inaugural winners.

The Royal County was among the 12 counties to contest the inaugural All-Ireland SF Championship and the 1st Leinster Championship was captured in 1895. Forty-four years would pass until the 2nd provincial title was annexed.

Meath's place among the strongholds of the Association was secured with the breakthrough All-Ireland SFC success in 1949 and since then, the Sam Maguire Cup has made six further visits to the county. The Leinster SFC record now stands at 21 and there have also been All-Ireland successes at Under-21, Minor and Junior level. A total of 26 Meath players have won 49 Football All-Star Awards. The National Football League has also been won on 7 occasions and it is also true to say that the once-off Centenary Cup success in 1984 was the catalyst for the county's finest era.

The county has produced some of the greatest exponents of the game ... Paddy O'Brien was named on the 'Team of the Century' while Martin O'Connell was similarly selected on the 'Team of the Millenium'. Sean Boylan's amazing achievements as team manager from 1983 to 2005 contributed enormously to Meath's reputation as 'one of football's great strongholds'.



And there was also the historic trip to Australia in 1968 when the footballers of the Royal County broke new ground by travelling to the Southern Hemisphere, under the guidance of the legendary Peter McDermott, thus helping to establish an International aspect to Gaelic football which has survived to the present day. Meath has consistently supplied players, captains and managers for the games with the Australians.

Hurling has also featured highly throughout the county's history but without the same success as achieved by the football teams. There have been 5 All-Ireland successes at Junior level and there are areas of the county where hurling is the best loved and most played game but it is proving difficult to make the breakthrough at senior level.

In terms of Administration only one Meathman has featured in the higher echelons of the GAA...Richard Blake from Ladyrath was the Associations' General Secretary from 1895 to 1898. Jack Fitzgerald is the only Meathman to have served as Chairman of the Leinster Council.

There are currently 59 clubs in the county... 15 (dual), 37 (football only) and 7 (hurling only)

The county can also boast of many of the finest playing facilities in the country and there is a huge input by volunteers on an ongoing basis to maintain Meath's place in the forefront of the Association's activities. Long may it last.

Methodology

- Focus Teams meet with Michael Delaney, John Cotter and Michael Reynolds of the Leinster Council late July 2009 to discuss progress.
- Club Forum held in the Knightsbrook Trim in August 2009. Hosted by Kieran Leddy, Croke Park. 139 Club Members attended.
- The feedback from the Forum was distributed to each Focus Team.
- Information then supplied back to a Steering Committee comprising of Cyril Creavin, Anne McDonnell, Mairead Delaney and Brendan Cummins.
- Meath 'Back on Track Forum' held in Trim. This involved a number of guest speakers from other Counties as well as a question & answer session.
- Further meetings took place with John Cotter, Leinster Council and Kieran Leddy, Croke Park, in September 2010
- The Steering committee completed Strategic Review using all of the feedback received.
- Review forwarded to John Cotter and Kieran Leddy, Croke Park for approval.



Games Development

Aim: To increase the numbers playing our games and provide our players with the best possible playing experience.

There is a long and proud tradition of playing Gaelic Games in Meath. However, we face increasing competition from other sports, from lifestyle and from changing demographics and we must continue to change and adapt to meet those challenges. How we continue to develop our games is the key component to the success of the GAA in the county. We must strive to ensure that every player in the county has the opportunity to play meaningful games in an informal, safe and enjoyable environment. We must aim for all players to be coached by a qualified coach and for our clubs and schools to continue to be centres of GAA activity.



Key Projects:

Go Games and Super-Touch

We will expand the games opportunities for child and youth players using the Go Games and Super-Touch games formats. We will aim for all child players to participate in regular Go Games blitzes and we will expand the rollout of the super-touch blitz program across the county.

Annual County Games Plan

In accordance with national policy, we will produce an annual Games Development Plan linked to National Games Development Grassroots to National Programme (GNP) objectives. This will be submitted to the Provincial Games Manager and to Croke Park.

Club School Link

We will ensure that each club has a link established with each school in their locality in order to promote the club in the school and promote the development of our games.

Code of Best Practice

We will roll out the GAA's Code of Best Practice for Youth Sport, incorporating a code of conduct that shows respect for fellow players, mentors and match officials. Best practice will also be developed in the recruitment and selection of those working with our underage players. This will comply with the





appropriate legislation requirements and guidelines in jurisdictions in which we operate.

Club-Coaching officer

We will ask each club to appoint its own club coaching officer whose main role will be to promote best practice in coaching and games development in the club.

Harmonise games development

We will harmonise games development and fixtures up to and including minor level to ensure a more balanced games programme is in place for all our players.

Respect Initiative

We will roll out the GAA Respect Initiative which promotes respect and discipline for players towards match officials and each other.

Qualified coaches

We will meet the national and provincial coach education targets to make sure every player is coached by a person qualified to the appropriate level.

Academies – Schools of Excellence and Development Squads

We will aim to provide quality coaching for leading club players in all age groups from u/14 to u/17 through Development squads. We will maintain squad sizes and rotate players with a target of 24 per squad for hurling and 48 per squad for football.

Recreational Games

We will roll out the new GAA recreational games, which will provide players an opportunity to play our games in a non-competitive and recreational environment.

Schools Initiative

We aim to give assistance to schools in promotion of Gaelic Games by providing trained personnel where required. We will ensure that the Second Level Schools Committee functions in accordance with our aims by providing a quality coaching programme for our Second Level schools.

Fixtures Scheduling

OUR AIM:

To provide players with a programme of games with increased emphasis on regularity and quantity thus assisting clubs to recruit, develop and retain their playing members.

Introduction:

Each year in Meath, the County Committee organises 1,000 games, between those played at youth level and those played at adult level. The provision of a balanced programme of fixtures for players remains one of the greatest challenges facing the GAA throughout the country. The provision of a coordinated programme of meaningful games for players, appropriate to their needs and abilities, is critical to the continued development of the GAA in Meath. All games must be regulated so that players experience fair play and can take part in well-planned and scheduled games as part of a balanced lifestyle. An outline of the number of league and championship games played by the 1st team of each club in hurling and football league and championship is included in the appendix.


Key Projects

Fixtures Planning Committee, Fixtures Planners and Master Fixtures Plan

We will ensure that there is a Fixture Planning Committee in place and we will recruit and train fixtures planners. This will enable us to put a master fixtures plan in place year, which will detail fixtures in all grades and competitions. We will strive to provide the best programme of games possible for our players across the county.

Young Whistler Referees

We will continue to recruit and train young referees. As we expand our games programme in the county, we will need to have a constant stream of new referees coming on board to enable games to take place. We will also roll out the GAA Respect Initiative to help foster an environment where







Review of Competition Structures

Each year, we will review our competition structures. This review will focus on the number of games players in each grade receive as well as the individual club grading. We will aim to provide each adult footballer with a minimum of 19 games and each adult hurler with a minimum of 11 games over the course of the year and an appropriate number of games for underage players.

Volunteer and Officer Support

Introduction:

We must continue to attract talented volunteers at all levels within the county and recognise how important it is to encourage and support them. Their work is what keeps the GAA at the centre of the community. Our training programmes will help attract and retain volunteers by providing a clear education path that allows them to progress according to their ability. The amateur ethos continues to be at the heart of our Association.

Key Projects:

Club Officer Training:

We will provide training for our club officers (chairman, secretary, treasurer, P.R.O., Registrar, Children's Officer and Coaching Officer) on an annual basis. This training will focus on the role of the officer in the club as well as best practice in all areas of GAA activity.

County Sub-Committee Structure Review

We will review the County Committee and Sub-Committee structure to:

- determine if the current structures are suitable to meet the changing needs of the county
- make sure that no-one is overwhelmed by their role; and
- reduce the chance of one role duplicating another.

Managers' Charter

We will put a managers' charter in place which will help ensure that the relationships between the County Committee, Management of teams and players is conducive to success.

Player Charter

We will put a player charter in place for our club and county players. This charter will help ensure that our players have the best possible playing experience in the county. This charter will include a commitment on the provision of a balanced programme of games for all players.

Club Support

We will promote the GAA Club Manual and other Club development resources to our clubs in the county. These resources will assist our officers in carrying out their role.

Theme: Urbanisation, rural de-population, and Club structures

Our aim: To increase number of active players and volunteers in urban areas, to sustain clubs in rural areas and ensure every child that wants to play Gaelic Games gets an opportunity to play.

Introduction:

The shift in population from rural areas to urban areas continues to be a challenge for the GAA. Meath is no different and the past decade has seen a major increase in the population of many urban areas in the county. We must change and adapt our structures in order to provide more players with an opportunity to play our games. Over the course of this plan, we plan to increase the numbers of players and volunteers active in clubs and schools in urban areas by 20%. We will put initiatives in place that will promote the club as the centre of the community.

Key project:

Urban Development Plan

We will set up a specialised committee to develop and put in place an Urban Development Plan. This plan will examine the structures of the GAA in the urban area in relation to the number of clubs in the area versus the population and will develop proposals on the regeneration of current clubs and/or the formation of new clubs. This committee will also examine our current club and competition structures and make recommendations to address the difficulties associated with a reduction of the population in rural areas.

Club boundaries and structure

We will examine guidelines to establish clear club boundaries in each urban development area. In rural areas, we will review our club and competition structures to address the difficulties associated with a reduction of the population.



Volunteer training:

We will undertake training programmes for volunteers who will oversee the urban development project in each area.

Centre of Excellence:

We will continue to use our centre of excellence in Dunganny to promote our games by having blitzes and tournaments on a regular basis.

Recreational games:

We will roll out the GAA recreational games as promoted by the Coaching and Games Committee

Key Projects:

Appointment of an Inclusion Officer

We will appoint an Inclusion Officer, whose role will be to encourage greater participation in our games amongst the new Irish as well as promote games for those with a disability.

Club Family Day/ La na gClub

We will encourage family days in our clubs, similar to the La na gClub days that were held in 2009 and 2010. These days will showcase our clubs to their communities as well and encourage new volunteers to become involved in our clubs.

Scór

The promotion of our culture is at the heart of the GAA and is what distinguishes the GAA from all other sporting organisations. We will aim to increase participation in Scór and increase the number of clubs taking part. We will also encourage our clubs to hold cultural nights.

Ladies Football and Camogie

It is encouraging to see the growth in the numbers playing Ladies Football and Camogie. We will work closely with our sister organisations to promote the Gaelic family of sports for the mutual benefit of all.

Planning and Infrastructure

AIM: To improve the overall club structures within the County.

Introduction:

In these challenging times, the need to plan ahead has never been greater. As a county, we need to constantly review what we are doing and ask ourselves if we can improve. Planning ahead in this manner will increase our ability to respond to new challenges as they arise. Our clubs can also benefit greatly from this process and we will aim to have all our clubs complete their own five year plan.

Key Projects:

County Plan Implementation

We will appoint a committee to oversee the implementation of this plan. This committee will meet on a quarterly basis to review progress of the plan and re set targets if needed and set new targets. There will also be an annual county club forum to discuss the progress and targets with our club officers.

Club Planning

This programme facilitates clubs to put their own five year strategic plan in place. We will train facilitators to deliver this programme in the county and we expect 10 clubs to develop their own plan each year. These plans will help ensure that our clubs continue to progress and prosper.

Centre of Excellence and County Grounds

We will upgrade facilities at Páirc Tailteann to include the possibility of new covered accommodation. This will help ensure that our patrons watch our games in a comfortable and safe environment. We will also review our facilities at Dunganny with a view to adding pitches and changing rooms. Currently there are three full size sand based pitches with lights, one astro turf pitch with lights, eight temporary changing rooms, toilets, canteen facilities and car park.

Annual Club Forum

Each year, we will hold an annual club forum where we will discuss all aspects of the development of the Association in Meath with representatives from our clubs. We will review all our targets as set out in this plan.

Funding and Financial Excellence

Aim: To develop sound financial structures leading to financial Excellence at club and county level.

Introduction:

As we continue to grow and develop the GAA in Meath, we need to ensure that there is sufficient finance in place to achieve our goals and our aims. In the harsh economic times in which we live, we cannot overstate the need to achieve value for money in all we do and we cannot underestimate the challenge that exists for our clubs and for the county in raising finance. We are fortunate to have a general public and sponsors in Meath that continues to financially support our clubs and the county. We will continue to work closely with our sponsors and will continue to put the best financial management practices in place in the county.

Key Projects:

Promote Club and County Attendances:

We will develop a strategy to help promote attendances at club games in the county and at our inter-county games. This will include advertising on radio and media, highlighting local fixtures in National Schools, arranging underage mini games during half time in adult fixtures and encouraging local clubs to promote games on their websites.

Marketing Plan:

We will develop a marketing plan to help promote the Association in the county. This will incorporate the provincial marketing plans at County Level. We will investigate all possible sources of revenue in relation to sponsorship of teams and competitions as well as various fundraising projects.

Supporters Club (Club na Mí):

We will maintain and enhance a relationship with Club na Mí which will have as its aims the promotion of support for Cumann Lúthchleas Gael in the county.

Club Credit Card Scheme:

We will roll out a club credit card scheme that will help raise funds for clubs. This scheme will facilitate the payment of affiliations, membership, insurance and tickets.

Annual budget

We will develop a budget that covers all activity under the control of the County Committee. This budget will be strictly adhered to.

Communications

This will give us a strong sense of common ownership, individual responsibility and a sense of pride. Communication is everyone's responsibility. We must use the latest technology to communicate quickly and efficiently with our members.

Key Projects:

Meath GAA Website

We will ensure that the GAA website is a 'best in class' website. It will be maintained and updated with all relevant information. We will provide comprehensive fixture lists as produced by the CCC and continue to operate and enhance our results service. This will lead to the publishing of updated tables for each of our non-knock-out competitions. We will also investigate the use of Social Networking (Twitter, Facebook, etc.) as a means of real time communication with our members and the general public.

Presentation of our Games

We will ensure that our games are properly organised and presented. All Co Board officials and stewards will be aware of their roles and Health and Safety Regulations will be strictly adhered to. A match-day schedule will be produced and that greater efforts made to ensure that spectators enjoy our games, and their safety is enhanced.

Implementation and Review Mechanisms for the Plan

This Plan is a living document: it will be reviewed, assessed and adapted to ensure it facilitates all units of the Association in Co. Meath in reaching their potential over the duration of the Plan. It will be possible to assess the success of the Plan in each county and indeed at club level within the county.

The County Committee will put in place a Strategic Implementation Committee. This team will meet on a quarterly basis and assess the progress of the plan against its stated objectives. The committee will be comprised of the County Chairman, County Secretary and three appointees.

This team will decide on the most appropriate method to carry out a comprehensive annual review of the Plan. This will include completion of an annual Club Forum where a detailed review of all relevant aspects of the Plan will be completed by Club representatives. This will involve the assessment of the current initiatives, their appropriateness for the needs of the club/county and the identification of additional initiatives to assist in the completion of achieving the goals and objectives outlined in the Plan.

Once the forum is completed, information, suggested modifications and ideas will be forwarded to the Strategic Implementation Committee for review and discussion. If required, the Plan will be modified and adapted based on the inputs. The Committee will also be responsible for communicating the modified Plan to all units at club and county level within the county.

Glossary of Terms:

Alcohol and Substance Abuse Programme (ASAP):

GAA programme that focuses on minimising the harm being caused by alcohol and drugs in society.

Award 1:

Coach education programme that qualifies the participant to be a lead coach for either child, youth or adult players.

Award 2:

Coach education programme that qualifies the participant to be an advanced coach for either child, youth or adult players.

Award 3:

Coach education programme that qualifies participant to be a master coach for either child, youth or adult players.

Centres of excellence:

Purpose built facilities, usually incorporating an all weather facility to be used by a number of club, school and County teams.

Club School Link:

Club support for local primary schools to ensure promotion of the club and the games

Cúl Camps:

An organised camp for children aged between seven and 13. They are run by qualified coaches and usually held during the summer.

Go Games:

Small sided skill development games for under 12's that focus solely on skill development and participation

GNP

Grassroots to National Programme. GAA games development strategy which aims to maximise participation and optimise playing standards.

Grassroots to National Programme (GNP):

GAA Games Development Strategy which aims to maximise participation and optimise playing standards.

'Have-a-go day':

A series of football and hurling recreational blitzes held for individuals or groups who have had little or no involvement in the GAA previously. These are held at club locations for newcomer or non-traditional communities.

Introductory Award:

Basic coach education for beginner coaches for child, youth and adult players.

Scór:

Initiatives and activities in which GAA members engage to promote Irish music, dancing and culture.

Supertouch 7s, 9s, 11s:

Small sided skill development games for youth players.
